


I. All students are ready for school

Goal	Results
E.I Social Emotional: In 2022, 90% of students in Sauk Rapids-Rice Early Childhood programming will be able to manage their feelings as measured on the TS Gold.	E.I 91.8% of 3-year-olds and 94.1% of 4-year-olds met this goal based on the TS Gold.
E.2 Early literacy: 90% of students will be able to say at least 10 letter sounds and recognize and create words that rhyme as measured on the TS Gold.	E.2 100% of 3-year-olds and 71.6% of 4-year-olds were able to say at least 10 letter sounds. E.2 47.3% of 3-year-olds and 75.5% of 4-years-olds were able to recognize and create words that rhyme as measured on the TS Gold.
E.3 Early numeracy: At least 90% of students will be able to create a basic pattern as measured on the TS Gold.	E.3 84.1% of 3-year-olds and 96.1% of 4-year-olds were able to create a basic pattern as measured on the TS Gold.

2. All Students in Third Grade Achieving Grade-Level Literacy

Goal: In the 2021-2022 SY, at least 80% of students in grades K-3 will be on Target or achieve "typical" or "aggressive" growth from fall to spring based on the FastBridge Reading assessment appropriate to their grade level.

3. Close the Achievement Gap(s) Between Student Groups

Goal

In 2022, the district will decrease racial and economic achievement gaps by 8%, while maintaining overall growth as measured by 2022 MCA Reading and Math test results.

Result

Based on the 2022 MCA math results, the racial gap decreased by 3.9%.

Based on the 2022 MCA reading results, the racial gap **increased by 1.1%**.

Based on the 2022 MCA math results, there was **no change** in the educational benefits gap.

Based on the 2022 MCA reading results, there was a **decrease of 1.2**% in the educational benefits gap.



4. All Students Career and College-Ready by Graduation

Goal	Result
In 2022 100% of students will have a grade level appropriate post-secondary plan by the end of the second trimester.	In 2022 100% of students had a grade level appropriate post-secondary plan started by the end of the second trimester.



5.All Students Graduate

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In 2021, 90% of our students will graduate in 4 years; 93% will graduate within 5 years.

Result

According to data on the MN Department of Education Website (Report Card), the 2021 4-year graduation rate was 85.2% with 5.5% of students continuing on their education. Five-year graduation rate was not available.

Achievement and Integration Goal Ia (Racial achievement gap)

Goal

By June of 2023, ISD 47 will narrow the reading achievement gap for students of color from 10% to 8.5% as measured by the results on the MCA Reading Accountability Tests which are administered annually in grades 3-8 and 10.

By June of 2023, ISD 47 will narrow the math achievement gap for students of color from 14.3% to 11.0% as measured by the results of the MCA Math Accountability Tests which are administered annually in grades 3-8 and 11.

Progress Update

*Reading Achievement gap increased from a 9.7% in 2021 to 10.8% in 2022.

*Math achievement gap decreased from a 19.0% in 2021 to 15.1% in 2022.

*Due to small cell sizes, this data is disaggregated by white and nonwhite



Achievement and Integration Goal Ib. (Educational benefits achievement gap)

Goal

By June of 2023, ISD 47 will narrow the reading achievement gap for students eligible for federal lunch subsidies from 18% to 16% as measured by the results on the MCA Reading Accountability Tests, which are administered annually in grades 3-8, and 10.

By June of 2023, ISD 47 will narrow the math achievement gap for students eligible for federal lunch subsidies from 13.3% to 11.4% as measured by the results of the MCA Math Accountability Tests, which are administered annually in grades 3-8 and 11.

Progress Update

Reading achievement gap decreased from 17.6% in 2021 to 16.4% in 2022.

Math achievement gap remained the same at 19.7% from 2021 to 2022
